A personal response


We hope you have enjoyed looking at this display. It is one person's response to questions of faith.

When you're faced with mind-boggling wonders of creation, it's rather daunting to summarise them on a few linen screens. So I kept quite close to the original story in Genesis and picked out just a few images. I aimed to make a celebration of creation for visitors to enjoy.

God commanded ...




Again and again the words from the bible and on the screens are God's commands, his authority: He said ... and it was done.
